

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

Vadarini, Milan, with "Quarters" (12 Units), 1996. Photo: Andrea Martindoma, 1966







Mona Hatoum Light Sentence, 1992 Photo: Edward Woodman




Mona Hatoum was born into a Palestinian family in Beirut and has lived in London since 1975, when the outbreak of civil war in the Lebanon delayed her return from what was initially intended as a brief visit. The sense of alienation and displacement felt by Hatoum at being stranded in a foreign country pervades much of her work, but is most apparent in her performance and video work of the early 1980s. Three early videos are included in the exhibition *So much I Want to Say* (1983); Changing Parts (1984); Measures of Distance (1988).

Since the early 1990s the focus of Hatoum's work has shifted towards installation, sculpture and, more recently, photography. The exhibition will include two of her most renowned and provocative installations, *Light Sentence* (1992) and *Corps étranger* (1994). *Light Sentence* consists of a darkened room containing a three-sided enclosure of wire mesh cages in which a single light bulb is continually lowered and raised. For the *Corps étranger* video installation Hatoum, with the

assistance of a surgeon using an endoscopic camera, navigated both the internal and external contours of her body. This video, with the accompanying soundtrack of a recorded human heartbeat, is projected onto the floor as a circular image within a circular walled booth, which the viewer enters through two narrow doorways.


Mona Hatoum Quarters, 1996

Also included in the exhibition are furniture based works, derived from beds or cots. These have been transformed by Hatoum so that they appear de-humanised whilst still remaining domestic and seductive. *Incommunicado* (1993), is a constructed steel cot whose supportive bottom bars are replaced by steel wire. *Quarters* (1996), is an uncomfortable cross-shaped tower of unusable metal beds, and *Divan Bed* (1996), is a coffin-like metal box mattress.

Other floor based sculptures in the exhibition are Socle du Monde (Base of the World) (1992-93), a homage to the artist, Piero Manzoni, whose work of the same title was dedicated to Galileo. This work consists of an enormous magnetic cube covered with iron filings that look like thick, winding intestine. The strange irresistible attraction and repulsion of the magnetic force thrusts the metal filings into a convoluted, organic pattern.

Intimately related to Socle du Monde are the two recent 'carpet' pieces, Pin Carpet (1995) and Entrails Carpet (1995), which are placed directly on the floor of the galleries and which seem to deny the possibility of physical warmth and protection. Pin Carpet is literally a bed of nails,
