Foreign Bodies is a multisite and multimedia installation for Zentrum fur Kunst und Medientechnologie, Karlsruhe. The project investigates Berlin as an intersection point for the new traffic in human beings, specifically the sex trade involving refugees from Eastern Europe. These refugees, in response to false advertisements and inducements, find themselves enslaved as brides and prostitutes. By interrogating this underground sex economy the project reveals a specific intertwining of male and female sexuality. This intertwining exposes the secret physical debt paid out on the lives of the women and the wound this enacts on the emotional lives of the men.

This underground territory will be simultaneously investigated as a double site. On the one hand a gruelling physical site, where brides and prostitutes are bought to work in the home and hotel, and on the other as a mournful fantasy site for male sexuality.

As regards subject matter, the project will be based on contemporary material relating to sex bride and worker refugees and their controllers. As regards form, the project will use the imagery and design of the bridal gown and the hotel room as a metaphor for the corporeal and fantasy spaces of contemporary male sexuality.

The project will focus on these issues through a narrative dealing with the relationship between a eighteen year old female refugee bride and her husband/pimp who sells her into prostitution.

Foreign Bodies has two components:

i) Video Installation:

a three channel interactive video projection installation, with computer interface, of 7 minutes duration for the Zentrum fur Kunst und Medientechnologie, Karlsruhe which will host the project. This installation will be electronically connected with the Berlin Museum's electronic archives on specific red light districts in Berlin.

ii) Catalogue
